Out of the Tombs and Into the Light

Introduction:

- A. Mark 5:1-20; Matt. 8:22-34; Luke 8:26-39
- B. Relate account
 - 1. Matthew mentions two demoniacs, Mark and Luke describe one (probably the fiercest and more dominant); Mark gives vivid details and a full narrative. Luke 8:28 "I" may imply a chief of the unclean spirits.
 - 2. The name of the demons was "Legion." A legion of Roman soldiers was 4720 men plus officers, roughly 5000. The name often meant many. Demons went in companies (Mary Magdalene Luke 8:2; Mark 16:9)
 - 3. Mark 5:19 Examine the power of the compassion of Jesus

I. THE POWER OF DEMONS

A. Mark 5:2-5

- A. The demon made him unfit for society.
- B. The demon made him restless night and day.
- C. The demon filled him with misery and pain.
- D. The demon could not be controlled by human power.

II. THE POWER OF JESUS OVER DEMONS

A. Mark 5:6-13

- 1. The demon came to Jesus in submission.
- 2. Jesus could control any number of demons.
- 3. Jesus commanded the demons to leave.
- 4. Jesus controlled the destiny of the demons.

III. THE STATE OF THE POSSESSED MAN

- A. Luke 8:27; Matt. 8:28
 - 1. He lived in tombs without family and friends.
 - 2. He was powerless and without hope; no one could help.

IV. THE COMPASSION OF JESUS

- A. Mark 5:14-15 Full restoration is given to the man
- B. The spiritual benefit outweighed any physical loss Mark 5:13
 - 1. I believe the loss of the hogs overshadowed the restoration of the demon possessed man in the minds of the people
 - 2. I wonder if that same spirit is manifested in Christians today

V. THE RESPONSE OF THE PEOPLE

- A. They feared the Lord and pleaded with Him to leave Mark 5:15-17
- B. The spiritual benefit of one soul was more important than the social interests and comfort of the many.
- C. The spiritual benefit of one man produced spiritual benefits for others
 - 1. Mark 5:18-20

VI. LESSONS TO BE LEARNED

- A. The Lord's works have made salvation available to all men regardless of their condition or worthiness in the eyes of men. The Gospel truly is "Come as you are; Just As I Am! Gal. 3:26-29
- B. Jesus has compassion on all who need salvation Matt. 23:37; Mark 6:34
- C. The Lord lets each one decide what he will do with the blessings given him.
 - 1. He did not compel the people to withdraw their dismissal
 - 2. He did not compel the man to believe and follow Him
 - 3. Many brethren love their worldly interests more than they love the Lord
 - 4. Many brethren have more regard for their material possessions than they have for lost souls.
 - 5. The Lord is often loved, believed, and followed more by people whose lives are a tragic mess than by folks who think they are well
- D. Jesus still invites everyone to come to Him
 - 1. You must be honest and humble enough to acknowledge that if you are outside of Christ, you are in no better condition than the man possessed by the demon.
 - 2. Matt. 11:28-30; John 6:37
